grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit.' As we seek to grow and bear fruit for Christ's kingdom, we recognise that sometimes God reshapes us, and our lives, to enable this growth to take place. The time of change can be hard and confusing, but by keeping faith and following where God leads us, we can emerge into the light with renewed strength and vigour.

The months of vacancy following the retiral of Hunter, our previous Provost, have been hard and confusing at times. I'd like to think that during this time we have been open to the possibility of God reshaping us so that we can grow in new ways. Many thanks to those in this year's Lent Group who have exchanged ideas with me as we discussed what makes our Scottish Episcopal Church distinctive. Discussions covered topics such as Ministry, Liturgy, Worship and Mission, often thinking about new ways in which we might 'be the church' in the future. Signs of new growth indeed!

Collect: O God, who alone can bring harmony to the minds of your faithful people: give us grace to love the things you command, and to desire the things you promise; that, amid the uncertain changes of this world, our hearts may be firmly fixed where true joys are to be found; through Jesus Christ, our Lord, who lives and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, world without end. Amen.

Holy Week and Easter in the Cathedral

There were one or two variations this Holy Week, including the washing of feet at the Maundy Thursday service - where in recent years we have had the washing and annointing of hands for service. And in place of the Holy Saturday evening vigil was a 6.30am Easter Vigil on Easter Sunday. Bearing in mind that the clocks had just 'sprung forward' by an hour we take our hats off to the Rev'd Philip who rose at heaven knows what time to travel from Kinloch Rannoch to be there. The flyers for Holy Week had promised 'The Easter Vigil with New Fire and Eucharist' and one person was heard to wonder if New Fire was a Christian music group - it's not and the name is still free for the taking! The cathedral was pleasingly full at the main 11.00am service and the service was joyful and full of music. The choir sang their hearts out and organist Geoff finished with a triumphant rendering of Widor's *Toccata*, followed by loud applause. That, and a beautiful cake with coffee after the service made you feel that Lent was over and Easter had well and truly arrived!

Despite fewer numbers our Easter Saturday morning felt like those of earlier years, with Jamie laying on craft activities in the Chapter House for the two youngsters who came along while in the cathedral and cloisters the somewhat diminished flower team were busy creating beautiful displays, with only a brief pause for refreshments of coffee, hot cross buns and delicious simnel cake. Well done to everyone - the cathedral looked stunning for Easter! Many thanks to photographers Marietta, Christopher and others for the photos on these pages.

Report on the Diocesan Synod

Held at St Ninian's Cathedral on 9 March

We started the day with a Eucharist at 9.15am at which Bishop Ian presided. Dean Graham and Lis were in attendance. The Bishop's charge included an emphasis on service and what that means for Christians, with the example of Jesus to the fore and to be imitated. The first session included a safeguarding report by Ian Boa, a report from the Ministry Board by Canon Nerys Brown, another from the Mission Board by Canon Liz Baker, a report on finance by Brendan Grimley, and elections and appointments. After a short coffee break, the second session included a discussion about the 5-10 year plans, mostly in groups. We considered our aims and challenges regarding the future, and I spoke on the importance of young people and families and argued for more outreach. Each parish seemed to have its own difficulties, such as overworked clergy and congregations that have more older people than ever before. After lunch, in Session 3, Isabelle Pottinger from the Mothers' Union spoke about the domestic violence project and urged prayer and action. Next for discussion was the Diocesan Net Zero Action Plan by the Diocesan Environment Group. 'With a limited budget, where would you start?' said a member of St. Mary's Aberfoyle.



The province will soon be appointing Champions of Net Zero. Bishop Ian said that synodality should be focused on and related his experience in Rome recently and how moved he was by it all. We voted on various Canons and Bishop Ian led the Confirmation of Acts of Synod. I proposed a vote of thanks to Bishop Ian himself, after which we dispersed and went our own ways with plenty of things to do and to think about for the future.

Jesus Christ Superstar

In February I went to see *Jesus Christ Superstar* with my mum at the Edinburgh Playhouse. I had never seen it before but my mum had and recommended it. I was very excited to go and overall we really enjoyed it. There were a few parts of the production I struggled with, including the choreography which seemed to use only one side of the stage and the lyrics weren't very clear so I couldn't really hear what the performers were singing about, but I have never seen an adaptation of The Passion so full of energy and emotion. I found it very moving the way Jesus and Judas in particular expressed their experiences, decisions and struggles. My favourite part of the show was during the scene of the Last Supper. The apostles finished their dance in a perfect re-creation of Leonardo da Vinci's painting which must have been difficult to do but they did it very effectively.

I think the most joyful part of the whole experience was that every seat in the theatre was taken. I know it can be a struggle at times to get people interested in Christianity so I was delighted to see so many people coming to see the musical. I'm sure a lot of them came just for the music or dancing rather than the story but I think it's really exciting that the show provided an opportunity to reach out to people who don't normally go to church or show any interest or belief in God. Perhaps they didn't all take in the message or the story but some of them might have, and I felt very uplifted that so many people came to support a Christian event. I know Jesus Christ Superstar isn't a musical to everyone's taste, but I hope you will all agree that it is deeply encouraging to experience such support for something that is central to our faith.

Two York Churches

Mrs Editor and I found ourselves in York at the beginning of Lent, to attend the dedication ceremony of our goddaughter Vanessa's little daughter, Tilly. Vanessa grew up in an Edinburgh parish of the Church of Scotland but started going to the York Community Church when she was studying music in that city. Indeed, she felt so at home there that she is now training to become a pastor in the church. The church, on a Saturday afternoon, was filled with those who had turned up to support Vanessa and her husband. They were friendly, the music (guitars and drums) toe-tappingly catchy, and the prayers very informal. There was a certain amount of arm waving, as you would expect, and Vanessa's mother said that she, with her arms firmly at her side, had never felt so Presbyterian. The ceremony was followed by tea and much cake and in the evening the church leader opened his house to a large number of Vanessa's family and friends for a buffet supper.

By way of a postscript, Vanessa was diagnosed with a brain tumour seven years

however, has left

her with partial deafness - very tough for a part-time musician - and with a degree of facial paralysis. She is a remarkable young lady and we, as her godparents, are hugely grateful for the prayerful support St Ninian's gave her.

The following day was the first Sunday of Lent so we took the opportunity to

attend the sung Eucharist in York Minster (pictured right). We expected much from the soaring Gothic architecture and great things from the choir (a visiting choir, as it happened, from the south of England) and were not disappointed. It is a truly wonderful building. However, we also went with a preconceived notion that it, being such a busy



tourist destination, would be perhaps a little impersonal. How wrong could we be! We were greeted in a very friendly fashion at the door and while sitting waiting for the service to start were identified as visitors by a verger and by Canon Tim who both came to welcome us. And then, during the peace, Canon Tim ventured down the aisle again and said, 'It really is very good to see you.' We in turn passed on the greetings of the St Ninian's congregation to that of York Minster.

We returned to Perth feeling very uplifted by our experience that weekend. Two very different services in two vastly different churches - one a repurposed Methodist chapel and the other a building which has been described as one of the world's most magnificent cathedrals - and yet both making a big impression on us because of the welcome we received.

From the Farquhar Diaries

21 April 1924. Easter Monday. Yesterday was a great day. Altogether we had 602 communicants... I was asked to preach at Evensong and all the 40 years I have been at the Cathedral I would have eagerly done so, looking upon it as a great privilege to continue the apostolic message of 'bearing witness to the Resurrection', but I felt too done and tired. I felt as if I were some other person when I came into the full Cathedral and thought that I had actually declined to be the preacher. Mr Sutherland Graeme took my place and, as he did 'bear witness to the Resurrection' in his own way, I was quite satisfied.

More and more, it seems, is our Reverend friend feeling his age. Extracted from The Diary of the Very Rev G T S Farquhar, which was edited and published by the late Margaret Lye, a member of our congregation.
